
The membership vote



Bringing the classroom to you



The IBEW College has launched a new virtual classroom which allows you to participate in various safety courses in real-time as they are being delivered at the College. Using your electronic device with an internet connection, you can participate in a safety course as if you were actually present in the classroom. It is very easy and simple to use, and does not require any specific computer skills. IBEW College staff are available to help if you experience any technical issues.

The virtual classroom allows you to:

- Watch/listen to the instructor teach the class;
- View videos & presentations on your screen;
- Ask questions & participate in class discussion using live chat;
- Complete the written coursework online.

When courses are being delivered utilizing the virtual classroom, it will be noted on the course schedule posted on the College website and Facebook page. The IBEW College is committed to increasing the accessibility of training courses for members across the province and will be making more training available through virtual and online resources where possible.

Improved medical benefits (no extra cost)

The improvements to the Benefit Plan that we've been working on have been implemented. All members in benefit will be eligible for the following on all claims incurred on or after July 1, 2017:

1) Enhanced Life Insurance and AD&D Benefits:

The Life Insurance benefit has doubled, increasing from \$50,000 to \$100,000.

The Accidental Death and Dismemberment benefit has also doubled, increasing from \$50,000 to \$100,000.

2) New Permanent Total Disability Benefit (Member Benefit):

A Permanent Total Disability benefit has been added to the Benefit Plan;

This benefit pays a one-time lump sum, tax-free benefit of \$100,000 following one year of continuous total and permanent disability as a result of either an occupational or non-occupational accident.

A new brochure with more detail on the Permanent Total Disability Benefit is on the way.


When using mobile equipment, we encourage and ask you to continue to pay special attention to prevent incidents. Please take a close look at the following points and ask yourself how you can contribute to a safer workplace:

1. Training, Experience, Competence

There is a difference. Make sure you are properly trained, competent with the operation and experienced with the equipment you are using. These things are critical, especially if you operate in congested areas or other places where there is the potential for other hazards to be present.

2. Hazard Identification and Control

Do a site inspection in the area where you will be operating the equipment. Be aware of hazards below, around, and above. Make sure controls are put in place where hazards exist.



3. Spatial Awareness

Always be aware of your surroundings. Keep your head on a swivel and your mind on the job when operating equipment. Do not be a sightseer or daydreamer.

4. Use a Spotter

A spotter provides the operator with an extra pair of eyes to help identify hazards and avoid hazards. Communicate with your spotter and make sure both spotter and operator are aware of their responsibilities.

5. Look Before You Leap

Before you move or operate the equipment, take a moment or two to think about what you want to do.

6. Keep Your Head In The Game

Don't become complacent. These machines are not toys. You need to respect the equipment and be aware of the limitations of the equipment – and your own limitations.

7. THINK!!!

Safety is a culture, a way of life and a way to save a life. Do your part and be a part of this culture.
